## Mine Details

### Project description

The Cullen Valley Mine (CVM) is located near the village of Cullen Bullen and approximately 23 km northwest of Lithgow and is owned and managed by Shoalhaven Coal Pty Ltd (T/A Castlereagh Coal). DA 200-5-2003 was granted for the CVM extension on 19 August 2004 and has been modified on multiple occasions with the latest modification (Mod 5) being approved on 15 August 2025. Approval is held for open-cut operations around the western extent of Tyldesley Hill. Up to 1 Mt of saleable coal can be produced per year, and upto 250,000 tonnes of coal can be transported a year by road to domestic destinations other than the Mount Piper Power Station. Operations ceased at CVM in 2013 before Castlereagh Coal recommenced operations in May 2022 to recover residual coal remaining at CVM before ceasing operations in June 2023. This mining will facilitate the site's final rehabilitation, which will be revegetated to forest habitat with comparable structure and floristics to the surrounding land.

### Summary of the scope and/or purpose of the new applications or modifications to existing approvals (if applicable)

During the 2025 reporting period DA200-5-2003 – Modification 5 was approved by DPHI on 15 August 2025. The modification approves CVM to:

- extend the life of mining from 19 August 2025 for a further five years until 19 August 2030.
- amend the current development consent boundary to include water management infrastructure (Dams 2 and 3) that are currently outside the development consent area.

Renewal application was approved for:

- ML 1556 on 20 September 2025.
- ML 1557 on 20 September 2025.

During the 2025 reporting period, a variation to EPL 10341 was approved on 11 December 2025. The variation allows for:

- U1.2 date of completion extended to 26 January 2026.
- U1.3 date of completion extended to 31 March 2026).

## Changes to land ownership and land use

There have been no changes to CVM land ownership and related land use during the Reporting Period relevant to DA200-5-2003 (as modified).

## Surface disturbance and rehabilitation activities during the reporting period

### Surface disturbance and rehabilitation activities that were conducted and an analysis of the progress against the rehabilitation schedule

No mining was undertaken during the reporting period.

### Rehabilitation planning activities that were conducted, including any specialist studies

Due to operations ceasing at CVM there has been limited rehabilitation planning at the site during the reporting period.

### Overview of subsidence repair and/or remediation works undertaken

The CVM site contains the former operational areas of the Tyldesley colliery, where coal mining via underground methods was conducted. Approval is held for the Feldmast underground mining operations under DA 205-5-2003, however no underground coal mining under this approval has commenced to date and none is planned. Ongoing intermittent / works to fill and pack small surface fractures emitting odours due to subsurface heating areas are undertaken as required.

### Overview of rehabilitation management and maintenance activities

Rehabilitation activities conducted at CVM during the reporting period have consisted primarily of weed management throughout the site.

No mining or rehabilitation activities were undertaken during the reporting period.

As no mining was undertaken at CVM during the reporting period this has delayed the rehabilitation schedule.

Rehabilitation and disturbance is carried out in accordance with the Rehabilitation Management Plan and Forward Programs as far as

## Rehabilitation monitoring and research findings

### Rehabilitation monitoring

#### The rehabilitation monitoring carried out in the annual reporting period

Rehabilitation monitoring was completed in the reporting period and included in the Biodiversity Monitoring Report. In 2025 rehabilitation vegetation demonstrates similar species diversity and cover to observations made during the 2024 monitoring round. The monitoring outcomes of rehabilitation areas indicate a consistent increase in the vegetation recovery and development of ecosystem functionality as established vegetation matures. Tree species richness is above its benchmark value for most sites. Midstory species richness at CVM Rehabilitation sites were beneath this value for almost all its sites. Previously senesced acacias were observed at many sites, and a juvenile regenerating midstory layer is present at most sites. Groundcover species are generally below their benchmark values at the monitoring plots. An increase in fauna diversity was recorded throughout CVM rehabilitation, along with continued observation of Squirrel Gliders list occupying nest boxes. The nest boxes were in good condition and continue to provide suitable habitat. Exotic vegetation cover is low across the compensatory habitat areas, with all sites recorded introduced species cover below 1% and only FP11 recorded the presence of High Threat Weeds. St John's Wort was recorded at 0.1% projected foliage cover.

### Status of performance against rehabilitation objectives and rehabilitation completion criteria

#### The monitoring program that has been implemented

The annual monitoring program includes an assessment of rehabilitation performance against relevant criteria in accordance with the Rehabilitation Management Plan. The program utilised baseline data, previous assessments, and current ecological data within defined

biodiversity monitoring plots including 15 Mine Rehabilitation Area monitoring plots. Recommend remedial actions include: • Ongoing monitoring works; • Priority areas and species for any upcoming noxious weed control programs; and • Requirement for supplementary seeding of relevant groundcover and replanting of tube stock.

**Appraisal description**

There are performance issues preventing rehabilitation moving towards achieving the final land use as soon as reasonably practicable.

**Rehabilitation monitoring program findings**

The monitoring outcomes of rehabilitation areas indicate a consistent increase in the vegetation recovery and development of ecosystem functionality as established vegetation matures. Tree species richness is above its benchmark value for most sites. Midstory species richness at CVM Rehabilitation sites were beneath this value for almost all its sites. Previously senesced acacias were observed at many sites, and a juvenile regenerating midstory layer is present at most sites. Groundcover species are generally below their benchmark values at the monitoring plots. An increase in fauna diversity was recorded throughout CVM rehabilitation, along with continued observation of Squirrel Gliders list occupying nest boxes. The nest boxes were in good condition and continue to provide

suitable habitat. Exotic vegetation cover is low across the compensatory habitat areas, with all sites recorded introduced species cover below 1% and only FP11 recorded the presence of High Threat Weeds. St John's Wort was recorded at 0.1% projected foliage cover.

### **Performance issues and their causes including identification of any knowledge gaps that must be addressed**

Sub-surface heating continues to be an issue at CVM impacting some rehabilitated areas. Castlereagh Coal continues to manage sub-surface heating as required and is investigating options to remediate the issue. A Heating Area Remediation Strategy has been submitted to the RR for review prior to commencing on-ground management in 2026.

<b>Active</b>	In the context of rehabilitation, land associated with mining domains is considered 'active' for the period following disturbance until the commencement of rehabilitation.
<b>Active mining phase of rehabilitation</b>	In the context of rehabilitation, the active mining phase of rehabilitation constitutes the rehabilitation activities undertaken during mining operations such as salvaging and managing soil resources, salvaging habitat resources, and native seed collection. This phase also includes management actions taken during operations to manage risks to rehabilitation and enhance rehabilitation outcomes such as selective handling of waste rock and management of tailings emplacements.
<b>Analogue site</b>	In the context of rehabilitation, an analogue site is a 'reference site' that represents an example of the defining characteristics (such as vegetation composition and structure or agricultural productivity) of the final land use. Characteristics of analogue sites can be assessed to develop the rehabilitation objectives and completion criteria for final land use domains.
<b>Annual rehabilitation report and forward program</b>	As described in the Mining Regulation 2016.
<b>Annual reporting period</b>	As defined in the Mining Regulation 2016.
<b>Closure</b>	A whole-of-mine-life process, which typically culminates in the relinquishment of the mining lease. It includes decommissioning and rehabilitation to achieve the approved final land use(s).

<b>Ecosystem and Land Use Development</b>	<p>This phase of rehabilitation consists of the activities to manage maturing rehabilitation areas on a trajectory to achieving the approved rehabilitation objectives and completion criteria.</p> <p>For vegetated land uses this phase may include processes to develop characteristics of functional self-sustaining ecosystems, such as nutrient recycling, vegetation flowering and reproduction, and increasing habitat complexity, and development of a productive, self-sustaining soil profile.</p> <p>This phase of rehabilitation may include specific vegetation management strategies and maintenance such as tree thinning, supplementary plantings and weed management.</p>
